boldly to migrants and refugees in need, working tirelessly to welcome them as valued members of communities all across this country and to ensure that they are protected and embraced. The mission of supporting migrants and refugees is needed now more than ever and we are pleased to report that in 2014 Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service (LIRS) has changed lives and successfully influenced policies and programs.

In 2014, the number of people around the world living as refugees from war or persecution exceeded 50 million—the highest since World War II. As we collaborated with our service partners and Lutheran leaders to support the ongoing work of refugee resettlement, much of our effort was also focused on responding to and supporting many of the 60,000 unaccompanied migrant children who crossed the U.S. border fleeing horrific violence in Central America. At the height of the border crisis, our team met daily to assess the ever-changing situation, evaluate capacity, and plan our response. LIRS also convened an international roundtable of Lutheran leaders, service partners, and child welfare experts from around the world to advance a coordinated response. Whether the need is immediate or long term, our collective impact relies on our efforts to take action on behalf of the most vulnerable.

From an advocacy standpoint, we were very active in 2014 with efforts to end the inhumane practice of detaining immigrant families—pressuring the Obama Administration and lawmakers to stop jailing immigrant families who are apprehended at the border. We will continue to be vigilant in working with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) to expand more humane alternatives to detention. It is more essential than ever to ensure that forcibly displaced families are protected and empowered.

In our efforts to equip others, our annual World Refugee Day Academy trained former refugees to engage their local communities in welcoming migrants and refugees. During the Academy, LIRS facilitated over 100 visits to lawmakers on Capitol Hill. In partnership with Lutheran leaders, service partners, and other allies, we continued to advocate for reforms that reflect our values on long-term integration and empowered newcomers.

We are especially thankful for the support of our Lutheran partners in commemorating our 75th anniversary in 2014 with a resolution honoring World Refugee Day, designating June 22 as Refugee Sunday. This was a bold declaration of the importance of ministry with new Americans. Refugee Sunday was the first time that Lutheran

congregations and individuals across the country reflected in a coordinated way on the courageous and often perilous journey made by millions of refugees. It celebrated how our new neighbors have become beacons of hope and renewal in our communities.

We are deeply grateful for your enduring commitment as we continue to confront the many challenges that impact migrants and refugees here in the United States. Your generous support has enabled us to have a notable impact on newcomers who remain resilient in creating better lives for themselves and their families. We thank you for your ongoing partnership and for standing with us as we seek to create just and welcoming communities for migrants and refugees.



2014 SAW THE HIGHEST LEVELS OF FORCIBLY

DISPLACED PEOPLE since World War II. Refugees fled persecution, trauma, and unspeakable violence. Their journey to safety was not an easy one. It required unrelenting resilience, courage, and strength. Forced from their homes, refugees often survive in camps or cities with little hope for their future. And their journey does not end when they are resettled in the United States. Separated from family, friends, customs, and all they know, they must begin to rebuild their lives in a foreign world.

LIRS and our national network of service partners walk alongside refugees throughout this journey to help lift their burden. We prepare refugees for their transition prior to their arrival in the United States. As refugees begin to rebuild their lives here in their new communities, we provide job training, English lessons, cultural orientation, housing and more. Local churches and volunteers add critical support in these ministries, driving refugees to appointments, orienting them in their new cities, and welcoming them into their homes. And we take a step further, educating receiving communities and local employers about their new neighbors and the gifts they bring.


IN 2014, OVER 60,000 CENTRAL AMERICAN

AFTER SPENDING THE SPRING AND SUMMER

responding to the record number of children fleeing violence in Central America, we knew we had to do more. Drawing from our strong Lutheran history of welcoming the stranger, we led an effort to organize an International Lutheran Roundtable to derive meaningful ways for Lutherans around the world to care for migrant children and families. We mobilized the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the

Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, and Lutheran World Relief to help facilitate the Roundtable. **More than 48 participants from six countries, representing 18 church institutions and organizations** participated. We came away with a deeper understanding of the root causes of the exodus of children and families from Central America, the United States immigration system, and how to best assist Lutheran churches in their ministries to these children and families.

EACH YEAR WE HONOR THE COURAGE OF

REFUGEES at the Walk of Courage Award Gala. In 2014, LIRS awarded Rich Cho, a former refugee from Burma and now General Manager of the Charlotte Hornets, the Walk of Courage Award. Staying true to his father's advice to "take pride in everything you do," Rich overcame indomitable odds and rebuilt his life here in the United States. His family was present as he dedicated the award to his mother and father.

We also honored Rev. John Frerking with the Walk of Faith Award for his tremendous compassion to migrants and refugees. Rev. Frerking and his former congregation, Faith Lutheran Church, walked alongside more than 200 refugees. Over 400 guests attended the celebration and, through their generous support, we raised \$376,000 so that our ministry can reach and welcome even more newcomers seeking safety.

Innovating Welcome for Refugees

LIRS BELIEVES IN THE LONG WELCOME, ensuring newcomers are not only protected but also become valued members of their new communities. We are constantly seeking innovative ways to foster this long welcome. Careers and Connections, an employment mentoring pilot project which began two years ago, has matched sixty refugees with a mentor—someone with professional experience and a strong network who can walk alongside persons who are ready to take steps towards defined career goals.

With the assistance of our local partner, Lutheran Children and Family Service in Lancaster, PA, refugee participants have taken steps to enroll in nursing school, gain their GED certificate, and make many other connections for both long-term employment success and deeper community integration.

U.S. Refugee Resettlement Program; ensuring the protection of migrant and refugee children; safeguarding the rights of migrants; and advancing fair and humane immigration reform. We believe welcoming communities and fair laws are essential to ensuring that migrants and refugees are fully integrated into society. We directly engage with Congress and the Administration to shape critical

policies and legislation impacting the lives of migrants and refugees and the communities that receive them.

Access to Justice

ASYLUM SEEKERS AND SURVIVORS OF

TORTURE FLEE to the United States in search of protection. But upon arrival, they are often imprisoned in immigration detention before they can make their case. LIRS's network identifies detained torture survivors and offers critical legal support. It often means the difference between life, and a new start, or deportation, and even death.

We equip local partners to train volunteers in providing services to migrants impacted by detention. And when the federal government reinstated the obsolete practice of family immigration detention in an effort to deter Central American families from seeking safety in the United States, LIRS and our network immediately went to work supporting these families.




